Dr. Lakshmi Bandlamudi is a Professor of Psychology at LaGuardia Community College, City University of New York. She works within the Bakhtinian/Vygotskian framework to explore questions about Dialogic Consciousness and Socio-historical epistemology. She engages in interdisciplinary work - bridging humanities and social sciences and Indian and western philosophies – to understand the interconnections between myths, culture, history and consciousness. Her recent book – Bakhtinian Explorations of Indian Culture: Pluralism, Dogma and Dialogue Through History (Springer, 2018) – co-edited with E.V. Ramakrishnan, emerged from a Bakhtin Conference convened by her in Gandhinagar, India in 2013. The volume points out the natural fit between Bakhtin's ideas and the pluralistic culture of India and premised on the fact that long before principles of dialogism took shape in the Western world, these ideas, though not labelled as such, were an integral part of intellectual histories in India. Her other recent book – Difference, Dialogue and Development: A Bakhtinian World (Routledge, 2015) is an in-depth exploration of the collected works of Mikhail Bakhtin to find relevance of key concepts of dialogism for understanding various aspects of human development. Taking the reality of differences in the world as a given, Bandlamudi argues that such a reality necessitates dialogue and actively responding to that necessity leads to development.

Her earlier book – Dialogics of Self, The Mahabharata and Culture: The History of Understanding and Understanding of History (Anthem Press, 2010) draws from the works of Mikhail Bakhtin, Lev Vygotsky, Giambattista Vico, Yuri Lotman and others, focusing on the broad problems of interpretation and in particular, about interpreting the personal past and cultural past (the epic text) to demonstrate how multiple histories (individual, cultural, that of the text and the very categories of understanding) intersect in the processes of novelization and canonization of the epic text. This interdisciplinary work is about answerability between lived life and living text and how the images of self and characterological profiles of the epic characters are drawn through the genres of interpretation.

Dr. Bandlamudi has been engaging in doing comparative analysis between Mikhail Bakhtin and Sanskrit Grammarian Bhartrhari, and Abhinavagupta's Aesthetics and has published papers in this area, in addition to several papers on dialogicality and various domains of human development. She is also an author of a travelogue – Movements with the Cosmic Dancer: On Pilgrimage to Kailash Manasarovar (2006) with a Foreword by H. H. The Dalai Lama and Introduction by Dr. Karan Singh This work records the spiritual quest against the backdrop of the physical journey in the Himalayas, weaving Hindu and Buddhist tales and philosophies.

Dr Lily Want is Professor, department of English Language and Literature, Islamic University of Science & Technology (IUST), Awantipora, Director, Averroes Centre for Philosophical Studies, IUST and Dean Outreach, IUST. Prior to her present appointment at IUST, she was Professor of English at the University of Kashmir, Hazatbal where she served as Dean, School of Arts, Languages and Literatures and Head, department of English. Earlier, she was Associate Professor at Faculty of Humanities, American University of Asia, Sharjah (UAE). Professor Want has been teaching for the last more than 37 years and has been rated as an excellent teacher by students in the various surveys by the University of Kashmir from time to time. She has been teaching courses like British Poetry: 16th to 19th Century, New Literatures in English, South Asian Diaspora Literature and Literary Theory. Professor Want is the author of several books mostly published by Cambridge University Press. Her articles have appeared in national and international journals. She also made numerous presentations at various workshops, orientation and refresher courses for College and University teachers both within and outside the country. She has organized a number of national and international seminars and workshops.

CHAITALI GIRI is a lecturer in English at MUCWC, Burdwan West Bengal, India. Her literary essays on various topics were published in many reputed journals. A short story of her was published in the daily, The Statesman. She has also authored a comprehensive study book on Agatha Christie's *The Murder of Roger Ackroyd*.
